



WHERE ARE OUR BANDS?

As a lad my father, Harold Wheeler, joined The British Legion Band to gain experience in playing musical instruments.

In 1928, at the age of 21, he applied and was accepted to become a member of The Royal Engineers' Band and being stationed at Chatham they were always known as The Local Military Band

Harold went on to become solo cornet for the following 16 enjoyable years until he came out of the service in 1945. During his time with The Royal Engineers he served in many places throughout the world including a long spell in Egypt.

Throughout the summer periods the band used to play at numerous venues including Buckingham Palace as well as playing at Town Bandstands for the real people to sit and enjoy the sun and music. PDuring the period up to 1936 the band would wear the Red Tunic which included the Busby. This smart dress was very similar to the uniform that is worn by The Guards to the current day. After 1936 and up to the present day the dress for the band is known as the 'Shacko'.

The Royal Engineer's Band had the honour of playing at the funeral of King George VI and because it rained all day everybody got completely soaked. This drenching caused havoc with the ornate uniforms and ruined the abundance of gold braid that made the tunics stand out from the rest.

All of the gold braid had to be replaced and it was my mother's task to spend many hours stitching on the replacement decoration.

My father's original uniform was given to the Royal Engineers' Museum at Chatham in 1976 for displaying along with many other military artefacts from a bygone age. All the exhibits can be seen by paying them a visit.

It is very important that we keep our heritage alive so why can't we have the band programmes back again on Sunday's at the local bandstands? There are still many local bandstands around such as at Maidstone, Folkestone and Tunbridge Wells, after

SQUARES - WANTED URGENTLY

NATURE NOTES FOR JULY

The sound track of holiday programmes from hill-top villages in Spain or Italy will often include the screaming of swifts. The area around St Margaret's Church, here in Rainham, will probably never be the subject of a holiday programme. But the sight and sound of a party of swifts, chasing each other over the roofs and around the tower of the church, on a late July evening, is as spectacular as anywhere.

The timing of the arrival at and departure from Rainham of the swift depends upon the weather and, more specifically, the availability of insects. Generally, however, the first swifts arrive in Rainham in the first week in May and the last leave in the second week in August. From observations I have made of the colony of swifts which breed under the eaves of St Margaret's Church I have drawn up the following rough timetable of events.

1st week in May:

Swifts arrive.

3rd week in May:

Three week incubation begins.

2nd week in June:

Young hatch. Six weeks to fledge.

4th week in July:

Young leave nest and migrate soon after.

1st week in August:

Main body of swifts migrate including nonbreeding yearlings.

2nd week in August:

Rest of swifts migrate.

I have two abiding memories of my swift-watching last year, both in August (albeit that these Nature Notes are supposed to relate to the month of July!). The first was a little after sunset (which was at 8.42pm) on August 5th. There were about 100 swifts in the sky high over the centre of Rainham. They appeared to have settled down for a 'cat nap' for the night in that they had adopted a rhythmic pattern of beating their wings for a few seconds then resting with wings outstretched for the same amount of time. At 8.50pm, however, a party broke away from the rest, descended rapidly and began to fly around the church, screaming to each other as they did so. About ten of the party subsequently peeled away from the

rest and, one by one, shot like arrows under the eaves of the church. These birds would have been parents going to roost in their nesting holes. They were apparently doing so only just before it would have been too dark to find the entrances. The remainder of the party, presumably intending to sleep on the wing, rose into the sky once more and, by 8.55pm, there was not a bird to be seen.

The second memory was of August 12th, a week later. It was 8pm and the sky was covered, almost from horizon to horizon, with dark storm clouds. Since there were no swifts about I was training my binoculars on a flock of black headed gulls returning to roost on the Medway. A number of swifts then came into vision, the setting sun occasionally picking out their underbodies. With my naked eye I could see them. It was difficult to judge how high they were but I later calculated about 1,000 feet above me. The were presumably overflying Rainham from a pair of the country further north. They continued to head south and soon disappeared into the darkening sky. It would be over 8 months before they were back in England.

THE RAINHAM WE LOST (part four)

Part four of Freddie Cooper's article about life on Cozenton Farm in the 1920s continues with his memories of some of the livelier animals. Parts one to three may be found in the May to July issues, the final part will be included in our September edition.

The work was hard in all weathers and on reflection I am amazed at the knowledge accrued by the men covering fruit, arable, animals, poultry and building repairs. I don't recall a vet residing in Rainham so if one was required I presume that he would have come from Sittingbourne (we had fewer dealings with the Medway area then). That would have been expensive so various workmen would have carried out most treatments. The Long family, living in one of the cottages, provided most of the workforce. Mr Long Sen, was foreman, Fred was cowman (after Cliff Trice). Bill also worked for a period (I heard fre-Bill a couple of years ago from Eastbourne). The cows had to be milked seven days a week and pigs,

horses and sometimes sheep had to be fed and inspected. In wet or cold weather those likely to be working outside would first go into the granary to find a clean sack which they tied around the waist with bine string to protect the lower back. I often compare their care with men I sometimes see with areas of their back exposed when wearing jeans. More wore heavy boots and gaiters and if you saw one limping he was probably the cowman because most of them had been kicked whilst milking at some time. Some cows were quite vicious and they seldom missed. We had a strong leather strap which was placed around the back legs of 'kickers' before milking started which, at that time, was entirely manual. Incidentally there's a 'pecking order' in

every herd and each cow had her own stall and would butt any other who made a mistake.

• One of my jobs during the summer holidays when I as about 12 or 13 was to drive the cows up the lane and along the A2 to a field at the top of Bloors Lane (now between Denbigh Avenue and Danson Way). They would normally feed for several hours and then lie quietly chewing the cud and my duty was to stop them straying onto adjacent allotments which were not protected by fencing. One morning Darkie joined the herd a few days after having her calf. She was mooing and obviously very unhappy at the separation and several times trotted down towards the thin roadside hedge. I managed to turn her back until just around lunch time when she put her head down and came full tilt totally ignoring my feeble efforts with a thin stick.

I had to decide whether to stay with the herd or follow Darkie who obviously new her way home as she ran up Bloors Lane, along the A2 and down Berengrave Lane straight round the farm. Luckily for me a window cleaner was working on Mr Hatche's house (the large one next to the school field, just east of the bridge). His bike was standing outside which I quickly borrowed to follow Darkie and rush back very grateful to find the rest of the herd were still in or around the field. I suffered that dream of a cow ming at me with head down for years into

'RAINHAM' IS UNDER THREAT ONCE AGAIN!

Some authorities are eliminating the name of Rainham from their activity usage, this was started by the Post Office who indicated that Rainham was superfluous and only Gillingham should be included in our addresses. When I made enquiries from their Customer Service Dept. it was clear that they only need the Post Code and road number. We all know that many commercial companies only need this when we telephone. I appreciate that post sorting is based upon area coding but I'm not sure that I want to get to the point when I have to tell people that I live in ME8 0EG.

Readers of the local papers may have noticed that Medway Council is using Gillingham instead of Rainham when planning applications are advertised.

is possible because roads with similar names were changed when Rainham was absorbed by Gillingham in 1929 from Milton RDC. Thus Webster Road was previously Milton Road, Shakespeare was changed to Hothfield, Oxford Road became Durham Road, and Hamilton Avenue became Salisbury Avenue. The only duplication is now our High Street and I wonder how much correspondence is delivered to wrong addresses when the post code is not used. I recently found a daft entry when looking for a key cutter in Yellow Pages, the address for Timpson's is shown as Unit 7C, Rainham Shopping Centre, High Street, Gillingham. I'm waiting for Medway Council to fall into the same trap!

The action taken by Gillingham Council 70 years ago was not seen at the time as a means of ceasing to use the name Rainham but within a few years residents became very irate when there was a proposal to alter the name of our Station. I recall, as a teenage reporter, attending a 'standing only' overcrowded meeting in the old Co-op Hall which was addressed by Dr Reed, W.H. Holding, Clr Cheetham and others when the proposal was condemned by everyone present and was quickly dropped. I haven't seen any protest by present Rainham Councillors 1st Medway's action!

Many residents are still proud to live in Rainham and I suggest that we all continue to use our Parish name on all of our correspondence.

I have always maintained that one should be proud of our family, our place of residence, our school and our country. I fear that we have failed to instill this pride into many of our youngsters which is a major cause of vandalism and lack of social responsibility. I'm sure that this is mainly due to living in larger connurbations and the failure to identify with or feel part of that community. The authorities are making that situation even worse.

There are dangerous practical implications. emergency vehicles now sometimes come from other areas. I've personally known ambulances to come from Sittingbourne and Northfleet, both apologised

for the delay because they didn't know the area. I can well imagine an ambulance man being given the name of Rainham Road as Gillingham tearing through from Sittingbourne beyond Bowater's roundabout thinking that's where Gillingham began! Rainham is still shown separately on all maps and drivers are unlikely to know that bureaucratic decisions have decided to ignore its existence particularly as they are now controlled from Hastings.

Perhaps it is an opportune time to mention the likely origin of 'Rainham'. Although Roman remains have been found in Lower Rainham there is no definitive source to which one can refer but the late Mr W.J. Smith, who was Headmaster of Orchard Street Senior Boys School and a local historian, wrote in 1937 that the known form of spelling included Reinham, Renham, Reynham and Raynham. He considered that the ancient Britons probably called the lower land 'Ruime' ie the Marsh and when the Saxons entered the Thames and Medway they settled in the creeks making an 'ham' or 'home'. The Saxon word 'Ham' also meant a 'bend in the river' so that the earliest settlement of our forefathers may have been called 'Ruime ham', ie the marsh in the bend of the river. The map shows how suitable such a name was. On the other hand 'Rain' or something similar may have been the name of a 5th century Saxon family as many settlements were named after a family such as the Gillings, Mere and Ceatta (Chatham).

Rainham has changed dramatically over the last two centuries as the population of 722 in 1801 had risen to 3,613 at the turn of the century and I reckon that somewhere around 40,000 now live in the area which was previously controlled by the old Rainham Parish Council.

I wonder how many are left who were descendants of those who were here 200 years ago!


