

Editorial

Our front cover photograph was supplied by a relative who now lives away from this area but all correspondents agree it was Ma Barrett's complete control of her charges followed by such a gentle voice that sticks in their memories Apparently before the canteen was built, one of the earliest in the area, she was the cleaner at the school and so had a very long connection with Solomon Road. Education continues throughout life and Medway Council are even now putting the final preparations to their Adult Education programme for the autumn. Last year a great many people did not receive copies but by the time we realised we should have had them it was too late to do anything about it.

Forsaking tradition this year we abandoned our annual Guide camp, under canvas, and took the girls on a holiday to Switzerland, primarily to visit the international centre 'Our Chalet' at Adelboden, but of course to enjoy a little bit of Swiss life in the mountains 'Heidi' style as well. The weather was perfect, too hot for me on some days, and as we managed to arrange the use of a coach for outings every day we wanted, we were able to have lots of excursions. Nature Notes

NATURE NOTES FOR JUNE

My late grandfather, Joe Ennis, was a smallholder and coal miner who lived on the edge of Charnwood Forest in Leicestershire. During the First World War he served with the 175th Tunnelling Company of the Royal Engineers, digging tunnels under enemy lines. Working underground with his pick and shovel he escaped the carnage above. During the long and bitter miners' strike of 1926 he supplemented his income from the farm by hedging and ditching for other farmers and by gardening at the big houses in Charnwood Forest.

Grandfather Joe could be very cantankerous and visitors to the farm were not always welcome. I soon learned, however, that he was very fond of his swallows and so, whenever I visited him, I took the earliest possible opportunity of enquiring about them. At least two pairs of swallows usually nested at the farm, one in the back porch to the house and one in a brick-built cattle shelter called 'the hovel' which was in the fields across the road. The pair in the porch got used to Grandfather coming and going and so it was possible to stand in the porch and watch the parents feeding their young. It was a great privilege to be trusted by those two swallows.

Grandfather is now dead and the farm sold. The porch has been demolished and the hovel stands almost roofless. Loss of habitat is one of the reasons for the decline in the numbers of swallows. Another is the widespread use of agricultural insecticides.

The swallow is a visitor to this country from late March into October and usually returns to the same nesting site year after year. Its nest is typically built on a beam in a barn or other farm shed and is made of a shallow cup of mud and grass lined with feathers and hair. Two or three broods are reared and nestlings may be found well into September. The sight of swallows skimming over water or buttercup meadows on a sunny June day is, for me, the epitome of

including Gore Farm at Upchurch. Although one traditional nesting site at the farm, a long and open cart shed, has recently been converted to residential use, one section remains open as a garage and a pair of swallows has nested there. Other pairs have returned to nesting sites in other farm buildings.

Mr Blee, the owner of Gore Farm, is rightly proud of what is, in effect, a nature reserve as well as a working fruit farm. Apart from the orchards and soft fruits, there is a wild flower meadow, a wood and an artificial lake, all of which can be visited via nature trails. At the Barn Yard, which is off Oak Lane, one can buy fruit and vegetables and have a cup of tea or a meal. Mr Blee publishes a bulletin every new season which includes news of the birds, animals and flowers that can be seen at Gore Farm. The latest bulletin refers to the kestrels that are rearing young in a nest box at the barn, the grey and red legged partridges that are nesting in the long grassy banks of the former brickfields, the ever increasing badger population and the many shelduck that have laid eggs either down rabbit holes or between the large round bales of straw.

If you come across Mr Blee whilst at Gore Farm (he is, I suppose, about fifty years of age and has the ruddy complexion of someone who works out of doors) do ask him about his swallows - or indeed about his resident barn owls, his pair of little grebes, his three species of woodpecker. He will be very pleased to tell you about them.

WATCH WHERE YOU WALK!

Since I moved to Rainham thirty years ago the introduction of traffic lights, roundabouts, pelican crossings, chicanes and other interesting items has provided plenty to keep the driver alert in Maidstone Road. The pedestrian has more time to observe the many different styles of building there, and the beauty or otherwise of the gardens fronting each house. But beneath their feet walkers can also trace the history of Rainham's water supply as illustrated by the stopcock covers in the pavement.

Freddie Cooper mentioned the Rainham Waterworks Company in his article in April this year, and outside many houses in Maidstone Road and

01634 376747 07970 555650 elsewhere the initials RWC can be seen on the metal stopcock covers. Closer study reveals that during its existence the company, which was set up by a few shareholders in 1881, obtained its covers from at least three different sources: Hayward Tyler & Co., London; Needhams, Stockport; and Littlewood & Son of Sittingbourne. In 1895 Frederick Littlewood was trading as 'engineer, millwright, brassfounder, tank and boilermaker and artesian well borer' at 33 High Street, Milton, and the firm, still producing castings, is on almost the same site - No. 35 - today.

The Rainham Water Company originally obtained its water from Keycol, via mains laid by the Milton Rural Sanitary Authority to supply Newington and Lower Halstow. In 1900, however, the Company opened its own works at White Hill, Rainham Mark. This drew water from a borehole which went down 920 feet into the Lower Greensand, producing extremely soft water. By 1903 this supplied Miers Court, parts of Upchurch and Hartlip and most of Lower Halstow (Meresborough had to wait until 1908 for mains water).

As demand grew Rainham Waterworks Company constructed further works and reservoirs at Bredhurst. at the top of Maidstone Road in Wigmore and at Matts Hill. A new borehole sunk here only went down into the chalk, so the water it produced was not as soft as the White Hill supply.

In 1946 Rainham's Company was amalgamated with the Chatham and District Waterworks Company, and I have spotted at least two different designs of cover bearing the initials C&DWW (1938) or CDWW (1954). The Chatham and District became part of Medway Water Board in 1956; this was absorbed by the Southern Water Authority in 1974; since 1989 our water has been supplied by Southern Water Services Ltd. All these authorities adopted stopcock covers with the appropriate initials, but replacements today seem to be anonymous.

When I found covers in Maidstone Road with BCGRWW (two dates, 1902 and 1911) I was puzzled, but thanks to Ron Martin, who was based for many years at the waterworks at Luton, I now know that these covers reflect the existence of the Brompton, Chatham, Gillingham and Rochester Waterworks Company, which had become part of the

Chatham and District in 1925. It appears that at least one water authority has been thrifty, perhaps when replacing cracked or broken examples, in using up covers belonging to several of its predecessors. This may explain why the dates on the covers outside some houses do not match the actual buildings. There is a particularly wide variety of covers in Ouinnell and Holding Streets, amongst them one with initials CWC ...

Perhaps readers may come across other examples: if so, I would be interested to know of them.

SOLOMON ROAD SCHOOL CANTEEN HUT

I enjoyed reading the article by John Austin in your May 2001 issue about the Barretts of Solomon Road School. I cannot think that any of their descendants would take umbrage at the affectionate tone of the words. One does not need to be famous to achieve immortality and Mrs Barrett has done just that. Several times a year either I or friends I am visiting use the words (sternly) 'Hands together! Eyes closed' (gently) 'Say your grace, dears'. My own memories are coloured by a conflict of ambitions between Mrs Barrett and myself. She intended me to eat her cabbage; I had no intention of doing so, my preferred diet at the time being peas and gravy. On the whole I think I won. The answer was to sit with others who didn't like cabbage, to eat the bits of the meal you did like and to push your plate to the middle of the table. When Mrs Barrett carried out her post prandial inspection and demanded that you ate the cabbage, you just said that you could not remember which was your plate. This ploy totally floored her. Mrs Barrett was a very dynamic character. In contrast, my impression of Mr Barrett was that he was a rather lugubrious man. I put this down to the fact that he could not work out a reason not to eat his wife's cabbage.

My now distant memories of Solomon Road School are happy. As with Mrs Barrett and the cabbage, the primary aim was always to beat the system. For example, air raid shelter space at the school was at a premium and your first ambition was to find friends in Solomon Road whose house you

while you waited for the all clear. If goodies were available, your hearing was always a bit suspect when the all clear sounded and you took your time getting

My only real claim to fame was that I eventually got to the exalted position of morning school bell ringer - Stanley Randall tolled the afternoon bell And a very difficult bell to ring it was!

If my memory is not faulty, Mr Austin and I were both members of the Rainham Branch of the St John Ambulance Brigade cadets under the benign control of Wesley P. Gransden of 52 Arden Street, Gillingham. Like Mrs Barrett, Mr Gransden deserved immortality, being one of the finest gentlemen I have ever met. I remember that soon after the war he and his wife Blanche opened their house to a young girl from Holland, Nellie Fokker. Nellie and the Gransdens visited my family in Rainham and in a gesture of friendship I offered her the chance to hold the family pet, the tom cat Tarzan, who had more battle scars than most World War 2 veterans. She shrank back in terror. When I mistakenly persisted in trying to get her to hold Tarzan she replied, 'In war mother and father eat cat'. That brought me down to earth and made me realize that OUR war had been easy in comparison.
