



Editorial

As for the past four years in March, we have just returned from our holiday 'down under'. New Zealand again this year and it was great. The weather was sunny and quite hot enough for us, shorts and Tshirts (for me anyway) and everything worked like a dream. When we decided to visit an active volcano island 50 miles offshore we managed to get the last couple of places on the boat and the sea was calm. We arrived, quite by chance, at Cape Kidnappers on just the right day for the tide to take a trip along the beach on an open trailer to visit a garnet colony, the chair lifts at Whakapapa were open on a gloriously sunny day, despite the forecasts of rain and high winds, to take us up yet another volcano and at one point a lady chased us two blocks down the street to return a 20 dollar note we had dropped. On the way home we had four days in Singapore, surely the most efficient city in the world. Our plane touched down at five minutes past eight in the evening and at that point we had no idea where we would be staying that night, yet by 9.45pm we had disembarked from a 747 Jumbo Jet (a very slow process normally), passed through passport control and immigration, collected our luggage from the baggage hall, selected and booked a hotel, travelled 27km into the city, checked in and were making a cup of tea in our room. Unfortunately this was all rather spoilt when we reached Rainham after travelling for eighteen hours plus from Singapore. We came back by train from Heathrow, it took about three and a half hours from touchdown which was not bad but we then had to walk up Station Road with our luggage to collect the car. By this time we were both wanting the loo so, stupidly, we left the heaviest case on the corner of Longley Road (at 10 o'clock at night) for literally less than five minutes whilst we nipped into the Bookshop to collect the car key and use the facilities. You guessed it, when we came out the case had gone. Whoever took it is welcome to the clothes, books and odds and ends, I cannot imagine they will be of any use to them unless they are middle aged and leaning towards the overweight, but what I am most upset about is that all our holiday film was in that case. If anyone knows where five rolls of undeveloped Kodak film has been dumped I would be very grateful for its return, it is the complete record of our holiday.

Whilst on the subject of 'good citizenship' or otherwise we have received an anonymous letter (therefore I will not publish it) this month but it does make a valid point about the amount of litter we have in our streets and parks. How can we encourage more community spirit? It is such a pity when pleasant places are spoiled by unsightly mounds of takeaway cartons, empty cans and bottles and general litter. Chewing gum is illegal in Singapore, how they enforce it I do not know, but their streets are clean.

However, back to reality now, the holiday is over, I hope we soon have some of the sunshine and warm days we have become used to and that we will be able to enjoy our countryside to its full this year. Until May have a happy month.

Nature Notes

NATURE NOTES FOR MARCH

Rochester is situated beside the tidal River Medway whilst Canterbury sits on the fresh water Great Stour. The flora and fauna of the two rivers are therefore somewhat different. In Nature Notes for March and April I compare the wildlife of Kent's two cathedral cities and, in particular, the two rivers associated with them.

In March I walked along the River Medway between Rochester Bridge and the M2 bridge. The route is part of the Centenary Walk created in 1989 to commemorate 100 years of local government in Rochester. Canterbury set up a walk along the Great Stour at the same time to mark the same event. The tide was in as I commenced my walk along the Medway. The predominant plant in the mud of the river was cord grass, one of the pioneer plants which take root in open mud. About ten lapwings were perched on Rochester Pier - all facing upstream, into the wind and waiting for the tide to go out. There were lots of black headed gulls either floating on the water or standing on boats. Mute swans and mallard were also in evidence. Three cormorants were preening themselves on buoys. Presumably the fish that had attracted them to the River Medway were whiting. When inland lakes are frozen, great crested grebes can also be seen diving for fish in the river.

In the shadow of the M2 bridge I came to Baty's Marsh (formerly Borstal Marsh), a local nature reserve and one of the few remaining salt marshes in the Rochester area. On the marsh grow such typical salt water plants as sea purslane, sea beet, sea clubroot, and sea arrow grass. A solitary carrion crow was the only bird I could see among the flotsam and jetsam covering Baty's Marsh. In summer the mauve flowers of sea lavender give some colour to the marsh but any reader wishing to see the flowers of a salt marsh in summer would probably find it more convenient to go to Horrid Hill at the Countryside Park on the Lower Rainham Road.

As I was retracing my steps the tide was gradually going out. Feeding along the edges of the river were

redshanks, a shelduck and a solitary grey heron. The latter was presumably looking for crabs. About half way along the Esplanade I had a nice view of the castle and cathedral, St Margaret's Church, Rochester Bridge and Frindsbury Church.

I returned to the leafy area (at least in summer) of the castle and cathedral. The predominant trees were deciduous ones such as sycamore, horse chestnut and beech and evergreens for example, yew, holm oak, holly and cedar of Labanon. There is an impressive double row of London plane trees, about 100 years old, in The Vines. It was good to note that a long line of tall Leylandii trees formerly in the cathedral's refectory garden have been felled. Attractive views of the garden can now be had from the upper floor of Francis Iles' picture galleries.

The houses on the south of the cathedral are mainly of red brick surrounded by ragstone walls. Many belong to the King's School and it occurred to me that it is a pity that we can no longer wander among the buildings of King's School, Canterbury. As I meandered alongside the houses and gardens of Rochester I could hear the songs of the mistle thrush, the blackbird, the robin, the dunnock and the song thrush. Some of those birds would doubtless be already nesting.

THE PROBLEMS OF THE SHOPPING CENTRE

The news of the enforced closure of 10 shops within the Rainham Centre has obviously caused consternation among the proprietors and great concern among the public at large. It is understood that those who have received notice from the landlords are Barry's Fruiterers, Morecut Butchers, Rainham Health Food Shop, Quidsaver, Boots the Optician, Bookmark, Xpressions, Ascot Flowers and Pet Supplies, who all expect to be closed for about 28 weeks. Some will obviously try to relocated as close to the centre as possible but the immediate problems for shop tenants and their staff is most worrying and the long term impact may also be far reaching.

The letter to 'all tenants' dated 14th March said that 'following the results of soil investigation it has been established that remedial works are required to

Of course such a disruption in the pattern of Rainham shopping has given rise to much conjecture in fertile minds particularly as to the cause of the problem which has not been made public and only a minority of residents will remember the buildings on the site pre war.

I was fortunate to mention the situation which has arisen to the well known retired builder Mr Len Bridge only to find that he was actually born in one of the three cottages which is now the 'Nationwide' shop so has an intimate knowledge of the area. His address was then number 14 London Road and if one views the buildings from the opposite side of the road it can be seen that the original external structure of all three cottages has been retained with shop fronts which have been altered over the years. Mr Bridge nded me that just west of the cottages was the Eksmith's forge thought then to be operated by Bill Arraman. Many of us hung over the half door to watch horses being shod or iron work being made or repaired. Len and I agreed that one never forgets the smell of burning horses hooves as the shoes were fitted and the value which both the smithy and the wheelwright next door were to a mainly agricultural community. These buildings together with a large white ex farmhouse next to the forecourt of Springates the wheelwrights, which was occupied by Mr Bodiam who ran the corn chandlers, now Meridian Spice restaurant, covered most of the present High Street entrance to the shopping centre. The other shops towards Station Road with the exception of Barclay's Bank have mainly the original structures with new fronts.

Mr Bridge recalled that all the old buildings would have had cellars, wells, cesspools and underground water tanks to collect rainwater. He considered that the wells were probably 50 to 60 feet deep, so the water courses were fairly close to the surface although now with heavier extraction they may be lower. The fields at the rear of the properties were young orchards pre war but the land may have proceed to be used for general agricultural process for which farmers dug large holes to obtain chalk to spread on the land and some of which were then used for refuse disposal purposes. The other

problem which has caused constructional difficulties locally relates to clay faults in the chalk sub soil which have to be excavated and refilled with concrete as otherwise the clay will expand and contract in a different manner from chalk.

A very large hole once appeared in the pavement in front of the shop next but one to the western corner of Holding Street and another developed outside the shops opposite to the bottom end of the old Chapel Lane (which is now the cul de sac just east of Mierscourt Road). Len seems to remember a hole suddenly appearing in the car park and most older residents had their own stories of sudden subsidence and the reasons therefore. Perhaps the most dangerous was the one that appeared on the railway line just east of Berengrave Lane which caused a derailment. I have a photo of the trucks.

No one locally seems to be willing to explain the actual cause which has necessitated 'remedial works' but one hopes that this will become apparent as it could have implications upon other buildings in or around the area. In the meantime it must be pure conjecture. Whenever a subsidence occurs north of the Church it is inevitable that the legend of Bloors Place tunnel is resurrected.



Road, Until, that is, National Service in the Army at the age of 20 (deferred due to Art School studies) took me to foreign parts in the Middle East in 1954. So I can well remember Rainham's contribution to the Coronation of 1953. Especially as in a small way I did my bit.

Freddie Cooper's extremely interesting reminiscences recalled those times. Despite food rationing which was still in force for some foods, limited means in many aspects of life, they were nevertheless very happy and contented times.

In 1953 I was in my next to final year as an NDD student at Medway College of Art. As an art student my somewhat limited expertise at that time was in demand. Part of Rainham's decorations for the great occasion, as mentioned, was the embellishment of the lamp posts down the High Street in the way of a banner hanging from each one, which I made and stencilled EIIR in my bedroom at 140 Hawthorne Avenue, to the displeasure of my mother due to the mess and spots of paint on the lino.

I can't recall how many were made out of Sizsal craft paper and wood, however I do recall that the number fell short of what was originally intended.

On the great day my family and close neighbours down the lower part of Hawthorne Avenue watched the great event on our 9-inch television made bigger by one of those magnifying glasses fixed to the screen. Dad and I spent the morning raising the back row of chairs on bricks and planks of wood, so that everybody had a good view while Mum made countless sausage rolls and pots of tea. My girlfriend Audrey, now my wife of 43 years, who was also an art student in the dress and fashion department, and I sat in the back row - wonderful days.

It's a great shame that not a lot is being done to celebrate the Golden Jubilee, but councils must take some of the blame for imposing so many restrictions concerning street closures which I don't think applied 50 years ago. It's also a great shame that school pupils will not be given the opportunity to purchase a Jubilee Mug from the schools. For the Silver Jubilee in 1977 I organised the sale of KCC mugs for my school at Gravesend where they went like hot cakes.
